(Phillips, 1993:77)

The rhythmic and repetitive nature of a song makes it easier for children to remember grammar rules and apply them correctly. Teachers can also create their own catchy rhymes or chants to highlight specific grammar points, making the learning process both enjoyable and memorable.

5. Interactive activities for active learning

Interactive activities allow young learners to engage with grammar concepts directly and in a hands-on way. These activities move beyond traditional grammar exercises and provide opportunities for students to apply their knowledge in creative and meaningful ways.

Sentence building exercises are a great example. Students might be given a set of words or phrases and asked to form grammatically correct sentences. Alternatively, word order games challenge students to rearrange scrambled sentences into their proper form. Fill-in-the-blank activities provide controlled practice, helping students internalize grammar rules by completing sentences with the correct grammatical elements. These activities give children the chance to practice grammar actively, helping to reinforce their understanding.

6. Using visual aids to simplify concepts
